I know there is a small road and a path in Edmonton named after Alex Decoteau, but that is simply not big enough for such a great man in Canadian and North american Aboriginal history. Here are some suggestions that the City of Edmonton naming Committee might want to consider. I have heard news that new schools, parks and libraries are being built in Edmonton, and the City of Edmonton Naming Committee is preparing to name them. One of the schools or libraries can be named in honour of Alex Decoteau. I know there are bridges and new buildings are being built as well, which can be named after Decoteau.

I have come to a conclusion that Alex Decoteau was a brave, kind generous, selfless and optimistic man, and that

naming a place in Edmonton after him will continue his memory. Edmonton had honoured him greatly when he died, so now we can honour him again by naming a big place in Edmonton after him.
