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Glengarry District Park Renewal

The Glengarry District Park Master Plan and Concept Plan started in 2016. The City of Edmonton Project Team worked with stakeholders and the public to create the Concept Plan, which was finalized in 2019. The Glengarry District Park is now moving forward with implementation of the concept plan with the first phase of design.



Project overview

This 22-hectare park is located between 132 Avenue and 135 Avenue and 90 Street and 85 Street in the Glengarry neighbourhood in North East Edmonton. The District Park is home to the Glengarry Community League, Glengarry Arena, Glengarry Child Care Society, City of Edmonton Community Services, O'Leary Fitness and Leisure Centre and St. Cecilia Junior High School and Archbishop O'Leary High School.


The District Park currently includes multiple soccer fields, baseball diamonds, a running track, tennis courts, playground, spray park, trails, benches and picnic areas, including one picnic shelter. The north half of the site is well landscaped with shrub beds and tree plantings.

As part of the 2019–2022 Capital Budget, funds have been allocated to renew portions of Glengarry District Park. Some park renewal elements proposed will be constructed in 2021 with funding currently available. Other park renewal and growth elements will be constructed in the future when funding is available.

For this phase of engagement, the project team was looking for feedback on the skateboard park and mountain bike skills park elements of Glengarry District Park. Both elements are growth elements and are not funded at this time. They will be constructed in the future when funding becomes available.

Decision-making process

It is important to note there are many critical aspects in the decision-making process. Along with public input captured through the public engagement process, the project team needs to consider technical requirements, City policies and programs and funds available to determine what elements are included in the final design and when different elements are constructed.

Engagement activities

The COVID-19 pandemic impacted nearly every aspect of daily life, including how we were able to connect with you about the Glengarry District Park Renewal Project. How we engaged

In December 2020, the City of Edmonton hosted two online learning sessions, one for the Skate Park and one for the Mountain Bike Skills Park elements for Glengarry District Park, both growth elements that are not funded at this time. These growth elements will be constructed in the future when funds are available.

Participants were invited to register for the online learning sessions where the project team shared a presentation and participants were able to ask the project team questions in a live Q&A session during the event. Recordings of the presentations in the online learning sessions were posted to the website after the events were concluded.
